"Those Who Mourn"

"Blessed are those who mourn, for they shall be comforted."

- 1. What is the blessing promised to those who mourn?
 - a. Take a minute to review the 7 blessings promised in the Beatitudes (v 3-10).
 - b. Review how these compare to the way we typically think of "blessing."
- 2. When we mourn, we are grieving something or someone that we have lost.
 - a. Read Psalm 51.
 - i. What words or phrases indicate to you that David was mourning?
 - ii. What had David lost (cf. v 11-12)?
 - b. Read James 4:8-9
 - i. What from these verses or the context help understand what is being mourned?
 - ii. How does the first sentence of verse 8 indicate what is lost due to sin?
- 3. Discuss the various ways that people express grief. How do you express your grief?
 - a. What comparisons can you make to the way we should express grief over sin?
 - b. Do you mourn your sin in these ways? How do you mourn your sin?
- 4. God's people will also mourn the sins of others.
 - a. Read Jeremiah 8:18-22.
 - i. What is Jeremiah mourning?
 - ii. What is his desire for his people (cf. esp. v 22)?
 - b. Read Psalm 119:134-136.
 - i. Who is oppressing the psalmist?
 - ii. For whom does he shed tears? Why?
 - c. Read 1 Timothy 1:15.
 - i. For whom did Jesus come? What does this mean for those who do not see themselves as sinners?
 - ii. Paul uses the present tense ("I am"). What does this say about how he viewed himself in comparison to everyone else? Is this how you view yourself?
 - iii. How would this attitude change the way you see other sinners? How will this help you to mourn for them?
- 5. It is those who mourn that are promised comfort.

- a. How does this compare to how our culture thinks about comfort?
- b. How have cultural ideas influenced both the idea of mourning over sin and what it means to be comforted?
- 6. Since it is sin and its impact upon our relationship with God that we mourn, the comfort we receive must be related to these things.
 - a. Psalm 32 is David's response to Psalm 51. Read Psalm 32.
 - i. What is a primary theme of this Psalm (cf. v = 1-2, 5, 10)?
 - ii. What emotions result from forgiveness (cf. v 11)?
 - b. Read Psalm 34:18.
 - i. What does it mean to be "crushed in spirit"? How does this relate to Matthew 5:3-4?
 - ii. What promise does God give in this verse?
- 7. Read the following passages to help understand how God ministers His comfort to His people:
 - a. Psalm 119:28, 50, 76.
 - i. How does verse 28 compare with Matt. 5:4? What is the source of comfort?
 - ii. What revives the afflicted I verse 50?
 - iii. Can you give examples of how the word teaches you about God's lovingkindness? Why does this give sinners comfort?
 - b. 2 Corinthians 1:3-4.
 - i. Where does comfort come from according to verse 3?
 - ii. What does God expect us to do with the comfort we receive?
 - iii. In what ways have ALL forgiven sinners received comfort from God? How does this help us to comfort others.
 - c. 1 Thessalonians 4:18.
 - i. What does Paul expect believers will use to comfort others?
 - ii. Why is comfort from God's word the only sure comfort?
 - iii. Is this the kind of comfort you seek when you're hurting? Is this the kind of comfort you give to others who are hurting?

Would you describe yourself as a "mourner" in the sense of Matthew 5:4? If not, what do you think needs to change?
