

Q24: Why was it necessary for Christ, the Redeemer, to die?

A24: Since death is the punishment for sin, Christ died willingly in our place to deliver us from the power and penalty of sin and bring us back to God. By his substitutionary atoning death, he alone redeems us from hell and gains for us forgiveness of sin, righteousness, and everlasting life.

Colossians 1:21–22 “And you, who once were alienated and hostile in mind, doing evil deeds, he has now reconciled in his body of flesh by his death, in order to present you holy and blameless and above reproach before him.” (ESV)

- What does it mean to have forgiveness of sin from God?
- How can we possibly be viewed as righteous?
- What does it mean to have everlasting life?

Why is it important to remember the necessity of Christ's death for us?

What are things in your life that are distracting you from remembering this?

How do these distractions impact your walk with Jesus?
