New City Catechism Class Week Fourteen

Q14: Did God create us unable to keep his law?

A14: No, but because of the disobedience of our first parents, Adam and Eve, all of creation is fallen; we are all born in sin and guilt, corrupt in our nature and unable to keep God's law.

Romans 5:12 "Therefore, just as sin came into the world through one man, and death through sin, and so death spread to all men because all sinned." (ESV)

Discuss the question:

- What about the answer to question thirteen makes this question necessary?
- Why is this question important in terms of understanding the character of God?
- Why is this question important in terms of understanding humanity (anthropology)?
- What is the "law" to which this question refers?

Discuss the Scripture:

- Who is the one man through whom sin entered the world? In what two key ways does he relate to us?
- Looking at verse 12 and the broader context of Romans 5, what does Paul say proves that all of mankind is sinful?
- In what ways have "all men sinned" (cf. Psalm 51:5 and Ephesians 2:3)?
- In what ways might Sabbath day violations be connected to idolatry?

Discuss the answer in light of the Scripture:

- What is meant by "all of creation" in the answer? In what way(s) is it "fallen"?
- What does it mean to be "born in sin"? What does it mean to be born "in guilt"?
- What does it mean to be "corrupt in our nature"? In what key categories of our humanity does this corruption manifest itself?
- In what ways are we "unable to keep God's law"? Does this mean that people are bad in every way? Why or why not?
- What is our greatest need as a result of our fallenness? In what ways is this need met now?

In what ways do you seek to live as if you are capable of keeping the law? How would your interactions with God change if you fully embraced your inability?
