

For what credit is there if, when you sin and are harshly treated, you endure it with patience? But if, when you do what is right and suffer for it, you patiently endure it, this finds favor with God.

For you have been called for this purpose, since Christ also suffered for you, leaving you an example for you to follow in His steps, who committed no sin, nor was any deceit found in His mouth; and while being reviled, He did not revile in return; while suffering, He uttered no threats, but kept entrusting Himself to Him who judges righteously.

Barbers, cooks, nannies, gardeners, secretaries, accountants, physicians

Ancient Roman Slave Culture

Status of slaves:

Non persona = no person No property, no rights, no ancestors, no name. **Prevalence of slavery:**

In Italy ~1 in 3 (33%) were slaves. Empire wide ~1-5 (20%) were slaves. Slavery today is estimated at between 45 to 70 million.

The New Testament and Slavery

Slavery is never condoned. Slavery is recognized as a real life-circumstance. The goal of the gospel is not social revolution. The gospel is radical and offensive to a culture obsessed with civil rights and personal autonomy. The gospel has and does lead to emancipation.

"Masters" = *despotes* The term is not necessarily negative. Christ is referred to as our *despotes* 3x.

Masters (despotes)

Royalty or government officials Land or business owners Merchants and artisans Just about any Roman citizen and even some slaves

How does this apply to us?

Being voluntary and "at will", the employee/employer relationship makes it different than slavery.

But employees **do** work under the authority of their managers and owners and ought to obey the principles taught in this passage and others like it.

If slaves could be commanded to submit, how much more should we submit to our authorities?

For what credit is there if, when you sin and are harshly treated, you endure it with patience? "Good" is not a statement about the condition of their souls but about their attitudes toward their slaves.

"Gentle" refers to their treatment in general.

These were masters who possessed "the milk of human kindness."

Submission to authority is contrary to our flesh even if the authority is good and gentle. God is good and gentle, and yet...

Acts 2:40

And with many other words he solemnly testified and kept on exhorting them, saying, "**Be saved** from this **crooked** generation!"

Philippians 2:15

...that you may prove yourselves to be blameless and innocent, children of God above reproach in the midst of a **crooked** and perverse generation, among whom you appear as lights in the world... Peter likely used the term "crooked" to identify these masters as unbelieving **and** cruel.
