Our Responsibilities in Reconciliation

#### **Gospel Community Distinctive:**

- A visible characteristic that is a reflection of the supernatural realities brought about by the gospel
- Something that makes a gospel community distinct from a natural community
- Notably distinct (different) from ordinary community

#### **Reconciliation:**

- The restoration of fellowship between two parties, which is marked by the exemption of hostility and the existence of harmony
- The end of the estrangement between God and humanity that was caused by original sin
- The "substance" of the gospel
- An inevitable by-product of gospel community

Background of Philemon

To Philemon, but not private

To the church at Colossae, but also to you

A Plea for reconciliation

#### Reasons for reconciliation:

- The fundamental reasons why we should be concerned about reconciliation with each other
- The truths, values, and realities that establish a framework for reconciliation as a distinct function of gospel community
- The convictions that would lead us to pursue reconciliation with one another, even at great cost

#### The Reasons for Reconciliation (vs 1-7)

- Because of our union with Christ & with each other (vs 1-2)
- Because of the Grace & Peace we've received from God (vs 3)
- For the effective fellowship (sharing) of our faith (vs 4-6)
- For the encouragement of the saints (vs 7)

To be bound to Christ is to be bound to the gospel message...

# If you belong to Christ, then the gospel message belongs to you!

The gospel message is inherently a message of reconciliation

10 I **appeal** to you for my child Onesimus, whom I have begotten in my imprisonment, 11 who formerly was useless to you, but now is useful both to you and to me.

#### 2 Cor 5:17-19

"Therefore if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creature; the old things passed away; behold, new things have come. 18 Now all these things are from God, who reconciled us to Himself through Christ and gave us the ministry of reconciliation, 19 namely, that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and

He has committed to us the word of reconciliation.

As ambassadors of Christ and ministers of reconciliation, appealing for reconciliation is part of who we are.

- To Appeal (vs 8-11)
  - Because you are bound to Christ and to his gospel message
  - Because you are bound to each other in invisible but unbreakable ways
  - Because of the grace and peace you have received from God
  - Because active & effective faith is made visible by reconciliation
  - Because I have already seen the Lord at work in you to encourage the saints

... A willingness to reconcile is the only option that is consistent with your faith

Our belonging to Christ and to each other in a gospel community should create a confident expectation that reconciliation can and should take place...

"Because of everything I've mentioned previously, I have enough confidence in Christ to exhort you to be reconciled to Onesimus,

even more so, I exhort you

for love's sake to be reconciled to him."

1 John 4:10-11; 19-21

10 In this is love, not that we loved God, but that He loved us and sent His Son to be the propitiation for our sins. 11 Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another...

19 We love, because He first loved us. 20 If someone says, "I love God," and hates his brother, he is a liar; for the one who does not love his brother whom he has seen, cannot love God whom he has not seen. 21 And this commandment we have from Him, that the one who loves God should love his brother also.

We are to pursue reconciliation out of the overflow of love that we have received from God when He reconciled us to Himself.

10 I appeal to you for my child Onesimus, whom I have begotten in my imprisonment, 11 who formerly was useless to you, but now is useful both to you and to me.

Onesimus' conversion holds out the hope that reconciliation is possible, and it strengthens the appeal for Philemon to forgive him and regard him as a brother who is useful in Christ.
