Do not fear or panic or be in dread of them, for the LORD your God is he who goes with you to fight for you against your enemies, to give you the victory."

When you draw near to a city to fight against it, offer terms of peace to it. And if it responds to you peaceably and it opens to you, then all the people who are found in it shall do forced labor for you and shall serve you. But if it makes no peace with you, but makes war against you, then you shall besiege it. And when the LORD your God gives it into your hand, you shall put all its males to the sword, but the women and the little ones, the livestock, and everything else in the city, all its spoil, you shall take as plunder for yourselves. And you shall enjoy the spoil of your enemies, which the LORD your God has given you.

Deuteronomy 20:15-18

Thus you shall do to all the cities that are very far from you, which are not cities of the nations here. But in the cities of these peoples that the LORD your God is giving you for an inheritance, you shall save alive nothing that breathes, but you shall devote them to complete destruction, the Hittites and the Amorites, the Canaanites and the Perizzites, the Hivites and the Jebusites, as the LORD your God has commanded, that they may not teach you to do according to all their abominable practices that they have done for their gods, and so you sin against the LORD your God.

Deuteronomy 20:19-20

When you besiege a city for a long time, making war against it in order to take it, you shall not destroy its trees by wielding an axe against them. You may eat from them, but you shall not cut them down. Are the trees in the field human, that they should be besieged by you? Only the trees that you know are not trees for food you may destroy and cut down, that you may build siegeworks against the city that makes war with you, until it falls.

Main Idea

Life in a sin-corrupted world will mean facing terrifying troubles that will require a well-reasoned faith and that will result in tensions among real-life realities.

There's a long list in a sin-sick world...

Romans 8:35

"Who will separate us from the love of Christ? Will tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or peril, or sword?"

Courage, drawn from a deep faith, is what is called for when facing terrifying troubles.

Deuteronomy 20:1-3 ...you shall not be afraid of them! ...let not your heart faint! Do not fear or panic or be in dread of them! But on what will faith and courage be founded?

Faith and courage will come from having a reasonable knowledge of what God plans to do.

But a reasonable knowledge will remind you that God's plan for victory is not as **you** plan it!

A reasonable knowledge will remind you that God has not promised to keep you from suffering and hardship but to be with you through it! Remember, Christ's promise of His eternal presence!

The tensions of weakness and responsibility.

Weakness

Deuteronomy 20:8 And the officers shall speak further to the people, and say, "Is there any man who is fearful and fainthearted? Let him go back to his house, lest he make the heart of his fellows melt like his own."

In the real world, weakness will make fear a real thing!

Fear is held in tension with responsibility. ...you shall not be afraid of them! Do not fear or panic or be in dread of them!

Note that these are commands!

Contrary to what the world believes and teaches, you are responsible for your emotions... Your emotions are commandable!

Commanding emotions...

...you shall not be afraid! (Deut. 20:1) Do not fear or panic or be in dread! (Deut. 20:3) Moses said to the people, "Do not fear" (Exod. 14:13) Take courage, fear not! (Isaiah 35:4) "Do not fear those who kill the body!" (Matthew 10:28) "Do not fear their intimidation and do not be troubled!" (1 Peter 3:14)

Commanding emotions...

Put on sackcloth, Lament and wail. (Jeremiah 4:8)
...you shall not mourn and you shall not weep, and your tears shall not come. (Ezekiel 24:16)
This day is holy to the LORD your God; do not mourn or weep. (Nehemiah 8:9)
Rejoice with those who rejoice, and weep with those who weep. (Romans 12:15)

Where do emotions come from?

1 Samuel 1:8 "Hannah, why do you weep and why do you not eat and why is your heart sad?" Proverbs 15:13 "A joyful heart makes a cheerful face, But when the heart is sad, the spirit is broken. Isaiah 35:4 "Say to those with anxious heart, "Take courage, fear not."

Where do emotions come from?

Matthew 15:19 For **out of the heart** come evil thoughts, murders, adulteries, fornications, thefts, false witness, slanders.

The Lord commands your heart!

Proverbs 3:1

My son, do not forget my teaching, But **let your heart** keep my commandments.

Proverbs 23:17 Do not let your heart envy sinners...

Proverbs 24:17 Do not rejoice when your enemy falls, And do not let your heart be glad when he stumbles. John 14:1 Do not let your heart be troubled; believe in God, believe also in Me.

What drives your emotions?

1 Samuel 1:8 Then Elkanah her husband said to her, "Hannah, why do you weep and why do you not eat and why is your heart sad? Am I not better to you than ten sons?" Elkanah connected Hannah's emotion of sadness to what she treasured, what she believed would satisfy her most. "Am I not **better to you** than ten sons?" Your emotional responses are tied to your treasures and the degree of value you place on them.

Matthew 6:21 "...for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Another case study...

Luke 18:22-23 When Jesus heard this, He said to him, "One thing you still lack; sell all that you possess and distribute it to the poor, and you shall have treasure in heaven; and come, follow Me." But when he had heard these things, he became very sad, for he was extremely rich.

He had an emotional response!

Your emotions are telling you what you treasure and how much. This is good news because you can learn to order the treasures of your heart according to the Lord's proper order.

Ordering your emotions...

Psalm 16:8-9 I have set the LORD always before me; because he is at my right hand, I shall not be shaken. <u>Therefore</u> my heart is glad, and my whole being rejoices...

Remember the ongoing reality?

Deuteronomy 20:8 And the officers shall speak further to the people, and say, "Is there any man who is fearful and fainthearted? Let him go back to his house, lest he make the heart of his fellows melt like his own."

Compassion is required, but let's not use compassion as an excuse to give in.

Conclusions:

There will be terrifying troubles! Are you reasonably growing in a knowledge of and faith in your Lord? Are you willing to accept that your emotions are yours and do the work of ordering them in righteousness? Do you see that your greatest treasure is Christ?
