

For of His fullness we have all received, and grace upon grace. For the Law was given through Moses; grace and truth were realized through Jesus Christ. No one has seen God at any time; the only begotten God who is in the bosom of the Father, He has explained Him.

Main Idea

Those who receive Jesus must receive Him as He is and must receive *from* Him what He intends to give.



Who is Jesus?

He is God enfleshed.

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Note carefully that John does not say that the Word "took on" flesh or that He was "embodied" or that He became "a man".

And the Word **became flesh**, and dwelt among us,

and we saw His glory, glory as of the only begotten from the Father, full of grace and truth.

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What is **Christian** belief about God?

God is three persons in one nature.

The Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit are each distinct *Persons* in the Godhead.

Yet they are the same in substance meaning that God is one God in nature.

What is <u>Christian</u> belief about Jesus? Jesus is one person with two natures.

Jesus is in nature fully God, and He is in nature fully man.

Yet he is one person, Jesus the Christ.

Who is Jesus?

He is God enfleshed.

He is the one and only from the Father.

And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us, and we saw His glory, glory as of the only begotten from the Father, full of grace and truth.

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The emphasis is on the "only", as John means to press home the one and only uniqueness of Christ.

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This parallels "with God"

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This is reinforced by John later:

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Though Jesus in His humanity was clearly born as a unique Son of the Father, this statement removes any question about whether John believed the Word to have been created or born.

This also parallels "with God"

John 1:18

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the only begotten God who is in the bosom of the Father, He has explained Him.

Though Jesus in His humanity was clearly born as a unique Son of the Father, this statement removes any question about whether John believed the Word to have been created or born.

Jesus is the eternal Son of God, eternally in communion with the Father, and eternally one with Him.

Who is Jesus?

He is the pre-existent and pre-eminent one.

Believing Jesus to be the sovereign Lord, the one and only pre-eminent One, will fundamentally change how you receive Him.

This looks back to God's revelation of His glory to Moses in Exodus 34:6.

Jesus came into the world to manifest the glory of God's character to us!

Note John's summary statement:

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Hebrews 1:3

And He is the radiance of His glory and the exact representation of His nature...

Because the Law <u>was given</u> through Moses, grace and truth <u>came to be</u> through Jesus Christ.

John is not intending to pit the Law against grace and truth.

He is explaining the fullness of Christ from which we have received.

Note what Jesus says...

Matthew 5:17

"Do not think that I came to abolish the Law or the Prophets; I did not come to abolish **but to fulfill**."

Jesus came to fulfill the grace of the Law by graciously fulfilling the Law for us!

What did He come to do?

He came to reveal the glory of God to us.

He came to fulfill the Law for us.

He came to bestow grace upon us.

Because, of His fullness we have all received, and grace coming upon grace.

All His own have received from Him grace coming upon grace.

What role does Law play?

The Law explains righteousness but has no power to produce it.

The Law cannot give grace, but it is an instrument of grace in that it shows us our *need* for grace.

Because, of His fullness we have all received, and grace coming upon grace.

Because the Law was given through Moses;

grace and truth <u>came to be</u> through Jesus Christ.

Jesus came *as* the grace gift to bestow the gift of grace upon His people!

Knowing what Jesus came to do will fundamentally change what it means to receive Him.

Receiving Jesus

What does it mean to receive Him?

It means to believe that He is the sovereign LORD.

And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us, and we saw His glory, glory as of the only begotten from the Father, full of grace and truth.

John declares that Jesus is the eternal Word, the glory of God, **Yahweh** in the flesh.

Note Well!

You have not received Jesus if you have not believed that He is *the* Sovereign LORD!

What does it mean to receive Him?

It means to trust in His saving grace.

Because, of His fullness we have all received,

and grace coming upon grace.

What is it that we have received?

Because, of His fullness we have all received,

What is it that we have received?

Because, of His fullness we have all received,

Jesus came to bestow *grace* upon a helpless, destitute, and condemned people.

Note Well!

You have not received Jesus if you have not received from Him the grace *that He* came to give you!

What does it mean to receive Him?

It means to believe that He is the sovereign Lord.

It means to trust in His saving grace.

It means to gladly welcome His rule.

Remember?

John 1:14

And the Word became flesh, and dwelt among us, and we saw His glory, glory as of the only begotten from the Father, full of grace and truth.

Jesus is the sovereign Lord!

Note Well!

You have not *received* Jesus if you have not thrown off your commitment to self-rule, gladly welcoming *His* rule over all of your life.
