God's Effectual Work of Salvation

1 Thessalonians 1:2-5

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We give thanks to God always for all of you, making mention of you in our prayers constantly, bearing in mind your work of faith and labor of love and steadfastness of hope in our Lord Jesus Christ in the presence of our God and Father, knowing, brethren beloved by God, His choice of you; for our gospel did not come to you in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction; just as you know what kind of men we proved to be among you for your sake.

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Main Point

The way the gospel came to the Thessalonians demonstrates that salvation is an effectual work of God and not due to any human effort; and this should humble us, fill us with gratitude, and embolden us.

Our Key Question: How did the gospel come to the Thessalonians? **1** Thessalonians 1:5 ... for our gospel did not come to you in word only, but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction...

An Important Preliminary Answer: 1 Thessalonians 1:5 ...for Our gospel did not come to you in word <u>only</u>,

but also in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction...

The gospel *did* come to them in words; in fact, it must come in words, but it did not come *only* in words.

God's Effectual Work of Salvation God's word came to them in power.

Gap. 20. 21(24)

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God's word came in power. It did *not* come with the mere force of human logic or rhetoric.

1 Thessalonians 1:5 ...for our gospel did <u>not</u> come to you <u>in word only</u>

It did not come in dependence on persuasive logic or skillful eloquence or rhetorical embellishment.

1 Corinthians 2:4-5

My message and my preaching were not in persuasive words of wisdom, but in demonstration of the Spirit and of power, so that your faith would not rest on the wisdom of men, but on the power of God.

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Sophists were common in the first century, and it was likely that some in Thessalonica were accusing Paul of being one, and a poor one at that.

1 Thessalonians 2:5-6

For we never came with flattering speech, as you know, nor with a pretext for greed — God is witness — nor did we seek glory from men, either from you or from others.

Paul did not come to them relying upon the common practices of the day, and this disappointed some who thought he should be more eloquent.

God's word came in power.

It did not come with the mere force of human logic or rhetoric.

It came with the effectual power of the truth.

1 Thessalonians 1:5 ...for Our gospel did not come to you in word *only*, **but also**

in power and in the Holy Spirit and with full conviction;

just as you know what kind of men we proved to be among you for your sake.

This power may have included miracles, but it was not limited to this nor even primarily this; and even if it did involve miracles, these were always attestations of the truth of the gospel and of the authority of the Apostles.

Hebrews 2:3-4

How will we escape if we neglect so great a salvation? After it was at the first spoken through the Lord, it was confirmed to us by those who heard, God also testifying with them, both by signs and wonders and by various miracles and by gifts of the Holy Spirit according to His own will.

2 Corinthians 12:12

The signs of a true apostle were performed among you with all perseverance, by signs and wonders and miracles.

¹ Thessalonians 1:5 our gospel [came to you] *in power.* Our gospel came to you with the full force of life-changing truth. Romans 1:16-17 For I am not ashamed of the gospel, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes...for in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith to faith.

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The Lord has chosen to save a people for Himself, and the gospel is not only the declaration of this salvation, it is the very instrument (the power) God uses to effect it.

We are tempted to believe that the effectiveness of preaching or evangelism is due to the persuasiveness of our words or the winsomeness of our presentation when in fact it is due to the power of God through the gospel boldly preached.

God's Effectual Work of Salvation

God's word came in the Holy Spirit. It did *not* come to them by way of any human effort.

1 Thessalonians 1:5 in power and in the Holy Spirit

At a minimum, this is set in contrast to "in the flesh" or in human strength.

We are tempted to believe either that our salvation is due to merit we have earned with God or at least due to our own ability to understand the gospel and to respond in faith. But salvation is not of ourselves!

Ephesians 2:8 For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that not of yourselves, it is the gift of God.

Ephesians 2:8 For by grace you have been saved through faith; and that **not of yourselves**, it is the gift of God. Apart from the grace of God, we are helpless and unable even to understand the gospel.

1 Corinthians 2:14 But a natural man does not accept the things of the Spirit of God, for they are foolishness to him; and he cannot understand them, because they are spiritually appraised.

God's word came in the Holy Spirit.

It did not come to them by way of any human effort.

It came by the effectual working of the Holy Spirit.

1 Thessalonians 1:5 [our gospel came] to you... in the Holy Spirit Our gospel did not come to you by way of human power but by the power of the Holy Spirit effecting the will of God. 2 Thessalonians 2:13 But we should always give thanks to God for you, brethren beloved by the Lord, because God has chosen you from the beginning for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and faith in the truth.

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Note the power of our witness... Acts 1:8

But you will receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; and you shall be My witnesses both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea and Samaria, and even to the remotest part of the earth.

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The power of our witness is the power of the Holy Spirit because it is the Spirit who generates life and illuminates truth.

Titus 3:5 He saved us, not on the basis of deeds which we have done in righteousness, but according to His mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewing by the Holy Spirit.

but according to His mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewing by the Holy Spirit. Our humility and gratitude are grounded in God's grace to us, that is, in His effectual work of salvation applied to us by His Spirit.

God's Effectual Work of Salvation

God's word came to them in power.

1 Thessalonians 1:5 ...our gospel [came] to you with full conviction

This is set in contrast to those people- pleasing philosophers who practiced flattery for pay. 1 Thessalonians 2:3-4 For our exhortation does not come from error or impurity or by way of deceit; but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the gospel, so we speak, not as pleasing men, but God who examines our hearts.

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1 Thessalonians 2:5

For we never came with flattering speech, as you know, nor with a pretext for greed... Man-pleasing is driven either by fear or by selfish ambition; both of which lead to equivocation due to lack of real conviction. Galatians 1:10 For am I now seeking the favor of men, or of God? Or am I striving to please men? If I were still trying to please men, I would not be a bond-servant of Christ.

Galatians 5:11

But I, brethren, if I still preach circumcision, why am I still persecuted? Then the stumbling block of the cross has been abolished.

2 Timothy 1:7 For God has not given us a spirit of timidity, but of power and love and discipline.

Timidity will be a great temptation as we are increasingly forced to face down the costs of gospel clarity.

God's word came with full conviction.

It did not come with equivocation, timidity, or selfish ambition.

It came to them with the force of unashamed and confident conviction.

Romans 1:16-17 For **I am not ashamed of the gospel**, for it is the power of God for salvation to everyone who believes...for in it the righteousness of God is revealed from faith to faith. Gospel shame is not generally seen in straight up embarrassment but in a softening of the message where it directly challenges the cultural commitments of the day.

Our calling is to proclaim the gospel without fear and without equivocation but rather with the clarity of full conviction.

Conclusion

Are you reluctant in your evangelism because you are afraid you won't say it right? Are you being humbled by the realization that your salvation was truly a gift of grace? Is your communication of truth unclear because you are afraid to say it straight.
