That which came as the word of the LORD to Jeremiah in regard to the drought: **"Judah mourns** And her gates languish; They sit on the ground in mourning, And the cry of Jerusalem has ascended. Their nobles have sent their servants for water; They have come to the cisterns and found no water. They have returned with their vessels empty; They have been put to shame and humiliated, And they cover their heads."

"Because the ground is cracked, For there has been no rain on the land; The farmers have been put to shame, They have covered their heads. For even the doe in the field has given birth only to abandon her young, Because there is no grass. Main Point

God's judgments will lead true believers to sincere confession of sin, resulting in restoration; but they will harden the rebellious, leading to their destruction.

Jeremiah was praying to the LORD, but he was also proclaiming to the people. His confession served as instruction and as an exhortation in regard to their need for confession.

The Content of His Confession

Verifiable iniquity

Iniquity focuses on the corruptions and perversions of the heart.

Jeremiah 14:7 "Although **Our iniquities testify against us**,

The evidence of their corruption and perversion was everywhere to be seen!

Jeremiah focused his confession on the corruptions of the inner person that led to outward transgressions. Are you sincerely confessing the continuing corruptions of your own heart?

Apostasy is repentance in reverse; it is a turning back and away.

The people had found many ways to turn away from the LORD and many ways to seek other sources. Are you seeking other sources?

Jeremiah 14:7 "Although our iniquities testify against us, **O LORD, act for Your name's sake!** Truly our apostasies have been many, We have **sinned** against You." The concept of sin focuses on the standard and our falling short of it.

Jeremiah 14:7 "Although our iniquities testify against us, O LORD, act for Your name's sake! Truly our apostasies have been many, <u>We have sinned against You</u>." There can be no "we" without an "I"!

Sincere confession is acknowledging personal moral failure and taking personal responsibility. Are you confessing your sins sincerely?

1 John 1:9 If we confess our sins, He is faithful and righteous to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.

A plea for mercy and salvation

The Consequences of Rebellion?

Jeremiah 14:10 Thus says the LORD to this people, "Even so they have loved to wander; they have not kept their feet in check."

Jeremiah 14:10 Thus says the LORD to this people, "Even so they have loved to wander; they have not kept their feet in check." Even after the rebuke of judgment, they persisted in stubborn rebellion. Jeremiah 5:23 But this people has a stubborn and rebellious heart; They have turned aside and departed.

Rather than respond with sincere contrition, they dug in and hardened themselves against the conviction.

The Consequences of Rebellion?

Rather I am going to make an end of them by the sword, famine and pestilence. For those who humble themselves and sincerely confess their sins, there is comfort and salvation; but for those who harden their hearts and refuse to repent, there is judgment and destruction.
