
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Jeremiah 31:33-34

Main Point

Even as the LORD executed
His judgments on His rebellious people,
He displayed His mercy by consoling
them with a profound promise.



What was the background?

A fractured family.

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It is easy to forget that Israel was a large family.

The House of Israel was the 10 brothers of the Northern Kingdom, often referred to as Ephraim.

The House of Judah was the 2 brothers of the Southern Kingdom with Jerusalem as their capital city.

The divided kingdom represented a family torn apart by bitter jealousy and selfish ambition.

This had become a proverb of the people.

Ezekiel 18:1-3

Then the word of the LORD came to me, saying, "What do you mean by using this proverb concerning the land of Israel, saying, 'The fathers eat the sour grapes, But the children's teeth are set on edge"? "As I live," declares the Lord God, "you are surely not going to use this proverb in Israel anymore."

It has always been a great temptation to lay the blame for social or national decline on the preceding generations. But this denies or diminishes personal responsibility.

Psalm 106:6

"We have sinned like our fathers,
We have committed iniquity,
We have behaved wickedly."

Their Thinking and Attitude

"But this people has a stubborn and rebellious heart; They have turned aside and departed." Since the Garden, it has been our inclination to blame the LORD for our condition and for the consequences of our own sins rather than to take personal responsibility.

But even in judgment, there is grace!

The Lord's Response

Correction and Rebuke

Jeremiah 31:29

"In those days they will not say again,

'The fathers have eaten sour grapes, and the children's teeth are set on edge.'

"But everyone will die for his own iniquity; each man who eats the sour grapes, his teeth will be set on edge."

The LORD was correcting them by reminding them of His Law.

Deuteronomy 24:16

"Fathers shall not be put to death for their sons, nor shall sons be put to death for their fathers; everyone shall be put to death for his own sin."

Then the word of the Lord came to me, saying, "What do you mean by using this proverb..."

Jeremiah 31:31-32

"Behold, days are coming," declares the LORD, "when I will make a new covenant with the house of Israel and with the house of Judah, not like the covenant which I made with their fathers in the day I took them by the hand to bring them out of the land of Egypt, My covenant which they broke, although I was a husband to them," declares the LORD.

The LORD had been gracious to the people and had repeatedly demonstrated His faithful love, but they repeatedly rebelled against Him and repeatedly turned to other lovers.

His judgments were just!

But they were also merciful!

Hebrews 12:6

"For those whom the LORD loves He disciplines, and He scourges every son whom He receives."

Jeremiah 31:27-28

"When I will sow the house of Israel and the house of Judah with the seed of man and with the seed of beast.

As I have watched over them to pluck up, to break down, to overthrow, to destroy and to bring disaster, so I will watch over them to build and to plant," declares the LORD.

Remember that Jeremiah had been appointed to proclaim their expulsion and destruction.

But he had also been appointed to console and give hope.

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The Lord promised to fully restore
His people to Himself by the work
of regeneration and transformation.

A work that *He* would do comprehensively by the remission of sins through Christ!

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Forgiveness found in Christ is the hope of the gospel and the only way to have peace with God.
